Introduction

In January 2016 Friends from around the world will gather in Pisac, Peru for the World Plenary Meeting of Friends World Committee for Consultation. This meeting (previously known as the international representatives meeting or FWCC triennial meeting when it was held every three years) is a meeting for representatives from all four FWCC Sections to tend to FWCC business, and is surrounded by worship and fellowship with Friends from around the world. All Yearly Meetings and other bodies that are affiliated with FWCC are invited to send representatives.

The theme of the meeting is "Living the Transformation: Creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God" This is taken from Romans chapter 8 verse 19. We hope that this theme will come alive for us in worship sessions, home groups and in the four consultations that will be taking place during the World Plenary Meeting as we explore what it means to be a member of the worldwide Religious Society of Friends and to discover how we are called to transformation in our lives and for the world.


How to use this booklet

This booklet explores four elements of the theme of the World Plenary Meeting "Living the Transformation: Creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God" These are: -

- Living the transformation
- Eager longing
- Revealing
- Children of God

Each of the four areas of the theme is explored through passages from the Bible, particularly from Romans chapter 8, from which the theme of the meeting is taken and from other Quaker writings. We have sought inspiration from Quakers of the 17th century who share how their lives had been transformed by their direct encounters with God. We offer Advices and Queries and other extracts from the books of discipline of different Yearly Meetings and Friends' churches to help us focus on the living out of our Quaker faith in the world. The plenary meeting will have a strong focus on youth with many young Adult Friends attending, so we have included experiences and insights of young Quakers from around the world with extracts from the book *Spirit Rising*. We also offer a few queries at the end of each section that we hope may serve to help you reflect and consider, individually or with other Friends. Many of the passages we have chosen are easily available on Quaker websites and most are also available in Spanish as well as English. You may also like to consider what other sources help inspire your exploration of the theme and bring them to Pisac to share in your home groups.

Living the Transformation



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Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. Isaac Penington's Opening

At last, after all my distresses, wanderings and sore travails, I met with some writings of this people called Quakers, which I cast a slight eye upon and disdained, as falling very short of that wisdom, light, life and power, which I had been longing for and searching after... After a long time, I was invited to hear one of them (as I had been often, they in tender love pitying me and feeling my want of that which they possessed)... When I came, I felt the presence and power of the Most High among them, and words of truth from the Spirit of truth reaching to my heart and conscience, opening my state as in the presence of

the Lord. Yea, I did not only feel words and demonstrations from without, but I felt the dead quickened, the seed raised; insomuch as my heart, in the certainty of light and clearness of true sense, said: 'This is he; this is he; there is no other; this is he whom I have waited for and sought after from my childhood, who was always near me, and had often begotten life in my heart, but I knew him not distinctly, nor how to receive him or dwell with him'.

But some may desire to know what I have at last met with. I answer, 'I have met with the Seed'. Understand that word, and thou wilt be satisfied and inquire no further. I have met with my God, I have met with my Saviour, and he hath not been present with me without his Salvation, but I have felt the healings drop upon my soul from under his wings. I have met with the Seed's Father, and in the Seed I have felt him my Father; there I have read his nature, his love, his compassions, his tenderness, which have melted, overcome and changed my heart before him.

What shall I say? I have met with the true peace, the true righteousness, the true holiness, the true rest of the soul, the everlasting habitation which the redeemed dwell in.

The Power of God

They were changed men themselves before they went about to change others. Their hearts were rent as well as their garments, and they knew the power and work of God upon them... And as they freely received what they had to say from the Lord, so they freely administered it to others. Grace

The meeting had ended and they walked towards their cars. On an impulse Rommel Roberts said, 'Take my bakkie, you know your life has been threatened, and they know your car.' Smuts Ngonyama looked at his friend, smiled his thanks and nodded. They swopped keys to their respective vehicles, and Smuts drove off first. Rommel soon followed him out of Mdantsane Township near East London, South Africa. He was driving along the road when suddenly a minibus overtook him and slowed down. In his rear-view mirror he saw a second minibus close in behind him. The he noticed a sedan car alongside him, it was filled with armed men. Panic flooded. 'This is it. I'm going to be killed.' Then he thought, 'I don't want to die fearful and unaccepting.' He looked through his window straight into the eyes of the man with the gun and smiled. The man suddenly said something to his driver and the car shot ahead, signalled to the minibus in front and then did a U-turn across the grass verge in the middle of the road, the two minibuses followed it and they disappeared. Rommel pulled his car over and sat shaking and shocked for a while before returning home.

In speaking of this incident, Rommel said, 'As I panicked, I suddenly remembered a drug addict I was counselling many years ago. I had sent him out to walk round observing

things and then come back to tell me when he saw. He told me of the graceful flowers which grow with beauty, asking nothing but to be themselves. People step on them or they get broken, but they are still beautiful.' Rommel elaborated, 'Graceful, implying grace and graciousness, and suddenly I wanted to die being myself, not filled with fear or anger. I wanted to let the gunman know that I accepted what he was about to do.'

Recognising the Spirit

From our deepest being, using all the forces of creation, the Spirit pushes itself into our awareness and demands our complete attention via a racing pulse, immobility, darkness in our eyes, loss of hearing and waves of emotion. These are whole-of-body recognitions of the Spirit as it breaks into our humanness and takes us wholly in its grip. How else is 'that which is beyond words' to communicate with us? And how else can we reply except through our bodies with laughter, tears, sweat, shivers, knots in the belly, tight throat dry mouth? When we dismiss these as passing emotions, we deny the Spirit and turn away from God. Indeed they will pass if they are not recognised and so will the light therein. This is the way the Spirit leads, and we must be open to it. We must embrace the Spirit's work within ourselves and others, not try to moderate or control it, and, above all, we must take notice of the messages we receive.

Dot-to-Dot

I used to ride to "quiet meeting" on the back of my Dad's bike. I would sit in the corner with felt-tips and Dot-to-Dot books trying to colour between the lines and not make too much noise. Later, I remember wriggling and fidgeting on the laps of friendly strangers, studying the facial expressions in the practically silent circle.

I wonder how much time I spent in that circle over the following years, in the ten minutes before creeping out to read, shout, sing, and draw in Children's Programme. I spent that time making faces at the other kids, watching the ducks out the window, counting different types of shoes, reading books from the library trolley, asking forgiveness for having snuck a spoonful of Nutella, listening really hard to see if God would talk to me...

I still remember the pride I felt the first time that I sat through a whole meeting, how nervous I was the first time that I gave a reading.

Now, after ten years of meetings, I realise how much I've changed. I still know how many beams there are across the meeting house ceiling and how many bars on the window, but I could no longer tell you the ratio of shoes to sandals or how many people had their eyes shut last Sunday.

I've been to quite a few discussions about how different people spend their time in meeting for worship, been given suggestions and things to try, but those ten minutes I have twice a month are different every time. I listen to and reflect on the readings and ministry. I breathe deeply. I admire the beautiful world out the window. I give thanks for the people who are present and think of those who are not. I try to clear my mind of daily worries. I try to focus on my feelings. Sometimes I just stare at the ticking clock waiting for it to be over. I've felt enlightened, relaxed, happy. I've made resolutions. I've come to feel a sense of peace. But I wouldn't claim to ever have cleared my mind completely or to have heard the Inner Voice.

Watching the younger children in the meeting as they wriggle and whisper, I'm reminded of how far I've come...and how far I have to go.

Why I Became a Quaker

What attracted me to the Quakers was the open-minded attitude toward spirituality. To build a faith out of experience rather than belief in creeds. My previous spiritual seeking had led me into exploring different eastern traditions and new-age spirituality. But I couldn't find a spiritual home in any of these traditions. My doubts prevented me from settling into a belief system.

I first heard about Friends when I was in a doubtful and agnostic period. I was surprised by the open-minded attitude and inspired by the idea of the Inner Light. It really spoke to me in my situation because I realized that even if I couldn't believe in anything else, I could still believe in my Inner Light. I had felt It inside me for many years and felt its bliss when playing or listening to beautiful music or falling into spontaneous meditative peacefulness when being alone.

I soon went to an unprogrammed worship and experienced it as soothing and meaningful. I could probe into that sacred feeling for the first time without distorting it with confusing words. I also liked the people I met and soon became friends with some of them. At the same time as me, a couple of other young people found their way to our meeting. Earlier on very few young persons attended the meeting, but now this is beginning to change. I soon found out that most of us had found the Quakers through the Internet, in several cases through the www.beliefnet.com site. In a number of cases their Belief-O-Matic test gave the result that the person completing it had a spiritual profile most closely matching that of the Quakers.

My experience with secularization in Sweden is that often young people reject religion and spirituality because they identify these matters with blind faith in dogmas. The only real facts are the ones that can be investigated scientifically. There is a tendency to look upon religious people as naïve. But I also see much spiritual longing and seeking among young people. There is a growing interest for meditation, yoga, and personal development.

In this situation I believe that the Friends have great potential. As a rich tradition on the Judeo-Christian ground, enhanced by the lives actions and testimonies of at least a dozen generations of Friends, there is an abundant well of inspiration for the seeker here. There is room for finding words but also silence, introverted mysticism but also extroverted activism, belief in Jesus but also universalism. There is room for spiritual seeking, sharing and communion, without the pressure to agree upon a certain confession of faith.


I became a member of the Swedish Yearly Meeting in November 2007. Since then I have gone through different phases in my spiritual life. I have expanded my understanding of Christianity. Worship

Have you ever asked yourself, *What is worship? And why do you worship?* These and many other questions have arisen for me. Often we worship when our hearts are not really in it, and we don't see the true way of worshipping, which is unforgettable and edifying. I share with you a little experience when I participated in a gathering of UJESA (Santidad Friends Youth Gathering) that took place in the town of Patamanta. All the young brothers and sisters worshipped and praised God, and when we did it we felt it in our hearts! How beautiful it was! Lots of young people came who were seeking the same thing I was looking for with such devotion.

It is in this way that we all have experiences and we learn and return with more strength to

carry on and not grow weary. It is like when a lion pursues its prey, the prey falls but gets up with more strength than before. This is how a Friend should get up when she/he falls. Also, worship gives consolation in moments of anguish, and happiness when one is cheerful. It functions as a complement to our faith, something like the sand is to the sea. As the word of God says, "Is someone happy? Sing praises. Is someone afflicted? Pray."

So, the only thing we can do when we are giving praise or adoration, let's not do it halfheartedly, but rather with our whole heart. Let's not fall away, but press on, persevere, and continue to follow the footsteps of the Master until the end of our lives.

The Quaker Experience of Waiting for the Revealing of God

Not by strength of arguments or by a particular disquisition of each doctrine, and convincement of my understanding thereby, came [I] to receive and bear witness of the Truth, but by being secretly reached by [the] Life. For, when I came into the silent assemblies of God's people, I felt a secret power among them, which touched my heart; and as I gave way unto it I found the evil weakening in me and the good raised up; and so I became thus knit and united unto them, hungering more and more after the increase of
