



The past year for the Friends World Committee was a time of sustaining Resilience and Hope, which became the theme of both the 2021 World Quaker Day and the 2022 Section Meeting.

On October 3, 2021, the FWCC Traveling Ministry Corps hosted an online, bilingual, semi-programmed worship celebration for World Quaker Day. The inspiring talk by Carmen Rosa Paye Chura of Union Boliviana on the theme became a form of spiritual preparation for the Section Meeting. The 2022 virtual Section Meeting had 33% participation from Latin American countries. Greater equity and involvement of Latin American Friends in all aspects of the Section's work is an important accomplishment we have cultivated over the last decade. Ten years ago, on average, 5 Friends from Latin American countries attended the Section Meetings. Today, we regularly have dozens or hundreds of Friends participating from these countries, proportional to their share of the Quaker population.

This experiment with a one day, virtual only event was so successful that we will be returning to annual meetings - in-person or hybrid in odd-numbered years, online-only in even-numbered years.

First-Ever African and Latin American Women's Conference

Representatives from FWCC hosted the first-ever Latin American and African Women's Conference in October 2021. Approximately 50 women participated in this joyful event that they themed, "Who shall I send and who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8) or "¿A quién enviaré y quién irá por nosotras?" in Spanish.



The preparation for this event was a great example of the power of the Friends World Committee to bring people together for worship and fellowship. Even the planning meetings brought together women from 5 countries in the Americas and 4 countries in Africa. Live interpretation was required with the coming together of so many different cultures, celebrating our faith.

The beauty of this event is that it was years in the making, starting with small conversations in 2015. In 2020, the widespread adoption of Zoom technology made possible the first FWCC All-Latin American Women's Conference.

The theme, “Bendecidas para Bendecir,” translates to “We are blessed to bless others.” This was the first conference to bring Latin American women together from the entire Section of the

Americas. Approximately 300 women attended from Cuba, El Salvador, United States, Bolivia, Peru, Honduras, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, and Mexico.

“We will forever hold in our hearts the images and sounds of women from Central and South America singing and performing music,” said Karen Gregorio de Calderón of FWCC Americas.



Financial Summary

In the second full year of the Covid-19 pandemic, our income held steady but our program expenses were again extraordinarily low. We had almost no travel costs, mostly online events and online materials. We also benefited from U.S. government pandemic support for non-profit organizations. We continued to prepare for a significant increase in program activities by investing in our fundraising team. Despite the significant decline in our investments, we drew much less than usual from our reserves, leaving us stronger for next year.

A few additional highlights for the year include:

- We enhanced our online orientation program for new representatives, led by David Ruiz Trejo of Mexico Reunion General. Grant funding enabled us to build a more robust system of videos and online exercises that new representatives can use on their own schedule. David is bilingual and has been a gift to FWCC in assisting both English-speaking and Spanish-speaking Friends to use the new system.
- We co-hosted a series of online bilingual Bible studies with Beacon Hill Friends House, featuring leaders from Bolivia and El Salvador.
- We held our first online training for Spanish-English interpreters in February 2022. Friends from seven countries participated. It was open to Friends who are involved with other Quaker organizations who want to build language inclusion. Future sessions will be held in the coming year. Future project work includes an upgrade to our interpreter resources including an online, interactive glossary of Quaker words translated into the many languages Quakers speak around the world.
- The Section participated in the every-10-year census of religious congregations in the United States. The staff collected current membership data on Friends in the United States and delivered its findings to the American Association of Religious Statisticians. Analysis continues and will be reported in the coming year. This effort contributes to a large, upcoming project to create an interactive global map of Friends.
- In December 2021, we began a new series of Friendly Consultations. The first two were hybrid events, on hybrid worship and Spirit-led climate action. The next two will be via Zoom about the Quaker Peace Testimony today, in English, and about Missions, in Spanish.

Traveling Ministry Corps

The Executive Committee's attention to matters of consultation and intervisitation gave us an even greater appreciation of the wonderful service and achievements of the Traveling Ministry Corps. In January 2022, we celebrated the 2020-2021 Traveling Ministry Corps cohort. We are deeply indebted to those Friends, as well as to earlier members of the TMC. We are equally grateful for the work of the Traveling Ministry Corps Program Group from 2015 until 2022 and especially its final Clerk, Bill Ehri. We hope to build on the good work done by all of those Friends as we embark, with God's help, on new approaches to promoting fellowship and understanding among all the branches of the Religious Society of Friends.
